LIFE LESSONS: WHAT YOU PUT IN -IS WHAT YOU GET OUT

Imagine you wake up one morning, and to your delight, you receive a note and an envelope containing \$864. WOW! It's your lucky day. You jump out of bed and ask, "Is this for real?" Mind racing into where you are going to spend this money and how it is going to work to benefit you.

With the initial excitement passing, you remember the note attached to the letter. Upon opening the note, you confirm that not only is this money real, but you will be receiving \$864 each day for the rest of your life. You break into your happy dance!

What an opportunity you have before you.

As you re-read the letter, you see a small portion you missed the first time which reads that you must spend the full \$864 each day or the remaining balance will be returned at the end of the day.

What would you do with the money? How would you spend this renewing resource? Many would initially quench their thirst for their favorite shoes, clothes, electronics. Some may then turn to food and experiences for their enjoyment. At some point, maybe you would even consider sharing some with your family and friends. I'd bet that you would be very strategic with this money and aware just how you would spend it each day.

This would certainly be an incredibly fortunate opportunity. However, what if I told you that the same opportunity has



already been offered to you? Most people believe this is an offer too good to be true. But the opportunity is there for you, every day.

At IJGA, we challenge our captains and work to develop character and leadership in ways that provide every opportunity for our students to realize this same opportunity. We focus first on building a strong sense of self-leadership and selfawareness which allows



our students to become more empowered rather than dependent.

These skills allow students to grow and develop as independent leaders, ready to apply their skills into college and develop into the leaders of tomorrow.

Allow me to share a glimpse of this opportunity with you. First take a moment and think of the last thing you ate maybe a sandwich, cookie, salad, pizza, soup. For clarity, pretend you just crafted and ate a salad with lettuce, carrots, arugula, chickpeas, sliced almonds and as you crafted away instead of sprinkling in your favorite dressing you weren't paying attention and accidentally put in plain mayonnaise. You packed it away for later. Upon opening it and taking your first bite, you realize the lesson ... what you put in to what you do — is what you get out.

In this example lies the key to unlocking your \$864/day dilemma. Your time is one of the most valuable possessions. Knowing this, if you were to receive one penny for each second in a day, you would receive 86,400 pennies — which equates to \$864. You have found your opportunity. Just like the salad, if you are not careful with what you do with your time, you may end up getting exactly what you put in to it.

Those who find the most success are able to pick and choose, remaining cognizant of what they put in and how they use their time in order to reap the greatest return for that time in the future. Your time is like a bank, if you don't give it interest, it will fail to grow into providing more opportunities for tomorrow. This is not an easy lesson, but one that has significant value. Take this with you and join our challenge to identify the top five areas you are spending your time (*\$864) and consider the quality you are putting in to it (rated 1-10). Maybe there are a few areas you can reinvest to provide the gains you seek in the future.



All in, all your time is up to you ... so in all meanings, spend it wisely!


MIND PUANGCHAROEN
